MONDAY KEYNOTE ADDRESS: *Living, Leading, Loving Your Mission*

Tom Carroll, CEO, TMC Leadership Consulting

Why do people commit themselves to an organization? What sustains people during difficult times? Does my personal mission have to align to my organization's mission? Is loving the mission enough to really lead an organization? Is being exhausted normal? Leading an organization is one of the most challenging, dynamic, ever-changing, rewarding, demanding and exhausting roles a person can take on. As the leader, you are expected to be the inspiring face of the organization. Join us to discover how living, loving and leading your mission matters to your success.

TUESDAY GENERAL SESSION: *When Humane Euthanasia is the Elephant in the Room*

Panelists: Anna Payton, Aurora Animal Care & Control; Lauren Malmberg, Consultant and EBI Instructor; Mary Tiefenbrunn, Champaign County Humane Society

Animal Welfare has dramatically reduced the euthanasia of animals through great strides in increased adoptions and returns to owner, and improved ownership retention. As shelter populations drop, our focus turns to animals with increased levels of behavior and medical challenges. With lower euthanasia rates, the public's expectation that every animal will be placed has increased and the pressure to do so has intensified. Animal Welfare groups face tough issues and questions: How do you establish euthanasia policies that protect the animal and the public? How do you do work through the difficult decision of euthanasia? How do you communicate to your staff, volunteers, and other stakeholders when an animal is euthanized? How do you respond to negative social media posts or other negativity toward your staff or organization surrounding these decisions? Join us for this panel discussion about how to navigate this difficult topic and explore how we can work together as a field to ensure best quality outcomes for the people and animals in your organization and community.

WEDNESDAY SPECIAL SESSION: *Aggression and Defensive Handling in the Shelter*

Trish McMillan, McMillan Animal Behavior

This workshop gives an overview of information and techniques needed to handle difficult dogs defensively in a shelter situation, including what to do when a dog is trying to bite you, and how to break up a dog fight safely. We will also discuss assessing behavior in shelters, as well as the importance of developing written adoptability criteria for your organization in order to avoid warehousing dangerous dogs and outsourcing euthanasia decisions to our adopters.

MONDAY'S OPERATIONS SESSIONS

Trends in Cat Housing and Design for Less Stress and Fear

Greg Taylor, Senior Director, Mason, A Midmark Company

Focus will be on current trends in cat housing for facilities, including intake, quarantine and adoption. The choices have grown dramatically in recent years from the ubiquitous stainless-steel cubes to offerings made from a variety of materials and incorporating new designs, such as separation of litter, removable divider panels, etc. The presentation will cover the pros and cons of different materials; how ventilation can be incorporated into units with glass fronts or restricted airflow; modular units; cleaning issues; and of course, cost. Finally, we will also review some of the recent trends in the design and layout of cat housing to promote adoption rates.

Refurbishing and Remodeling Animal Housing Facilities

Greg Taylor, Senior Director, Mason, A Midmark Company

Topic points will include different ways to refurbish kennels and catteries to make them more attractive and less prone to disease outbreaks; common problems encountered with rehabbing animal facilities and ways to address them; types of equipment that can be transferred and redeployed at a new facility down the road, incorporating new sound abatement technologies, etc. We will also briefly discuss the challenges and solutions to hiring contractors for this type of work.

Low Stress Care – Intake and First Days: Part 1 & 2

Dr. Sally Foote, Bella Behavior

This workshop will give specific training on the less stressful exam, restraint, blood draw and husbandry techniques. Emphasis on reading body language, approach and how to use rewards with handling for exam and care in the shelter setting.

MONDAY'S FIELD SERVICES SESSIONS

Your Community, Task Force, and Investigators Approach to Hoarding – Part 1 & 2

Belinda Lewis, President, M & B Enterprises, LLC

This class is designed to go beyond the typical environment and animal population of a hoarder that many in our profession have already encountered. After initial review of the basics we will branch out. What knowledge and "tools" do you need in your agency and community for proper prevention, intervention, and response? Know your subject for proper communication that meets the hoarders needs. Are you ready to address this as a crime scene for a professional prosecutor's package if needed? The mental health theories of cause will be visited while the nuts and bolts of your ordinance, multi-agency response, and approach to impoundment and case processing will be examined to ensure the toolkit is stocked when the next hoarding case comes along.

Shelter Safety

Kevin Hearst, Adjunct Professor/ Instructor, Law Enforcement Training Institute

A comprehensive approach to providing a safe environment inside and outside shelter facilities will be presented. No shock value, just real tips to address everyday mishaps and mistakes. Let's stir-up intelligent conversation that leads to a positive result for both the animal and employee. We will discuss fundamental guidelines for following: (SOP) Standard Operation Procedures, and supervisor training revisions and review safety areas and equipment.

Criminally Navigating Animal Abuse

Jeff Brown, Chief Animal Protection Unit, Assistant State's Attorney, Will County State's Attorney Office

This workshop will give an overview of the criminal law process involving animals in Illinois. It will cover how to navigate animal abuse investigations from beginning to end.

TUESDAY'S LEADERSHIP SESSIONS

Through the Looking Glass: Transparency Saves Lives

The key to engaging your community, saving more lives and increasing your ability to help more animals is directly tied to being transparent about your struggles and success. In this session, participants will learn how to overcome the fear associated with being transparent with their followers, how to message in a positive but honest way and how to make small changes in story-telling that will yield big results.

Bridging the Gap: Understanding Adopter Expectations, Perception and Reality

In this session, we will get into all of the data that we have been collecting for the past several years, share specific insights into the adopter experience, and explain trends we are seeing with online pet searching. We will also share insights into the gaps between perception and reality and how your organization can boost or break your reputation with potential adopters.

Leadership from the Heart: Building a Leadership Culture

Manage Things, Lead People. This workshop will explore the need for and value of leadership at every level of your organization and practical steps that can be taken to build leaders within your organization and a culture that values and develops leadership. Utilizing his experience at four not-for-profit organizations with a model entitled, Leadership from the Heart, the workshop facilitator will share the concept of a Leadership Academy within your organization to develop the leadership capabilities of your management staff.

Changing Laws to Help Public Safety and Animal Welfare

Laws and ordinances protect people and animals throughout the state and CAN be changed by those in animal welfare with the knowledge, experience, and dedication to improve conditions for all. Learn the steps to identify a need for change, find or craft good language, build constituencies with other groups, identify sponsors, and lobby effectively for change. Also included will be an update on recent changes to Illinois state law and potential trends in changing animal law.

TUESDAY'S OPERATIONS SESSIONS

Behavioral Needs of Cats in Shelter and Rescue

Pamela Hill, Cat Behavior Consultant, That Cat Girl, LLC

It can be challenging for cats to survive and thrive in a shelter or rescue. But why is being sheltered so hard on cats, and what can you do about it? In this session, we will examine the fundamental behavioral needs of cats and how they relate to all aspects of a shelter environment. You will also learn how to increase cat welfare and adoptability through a care strategy that is based on those needs. Everyone who attends can expect to leave with a greater understanding of how to bolster cat well-being and several easy-to-implement ideas for improving their own shelter or rescue.

FeLV and FIV: Are They Manageable for You?

Dr. Emily Swiniarski, Chief Medical Officer, PAWS Chicago

Feline leukemia virus (FeLV) and feline immunodeficiency virus (FIV) are complex viruses affecting cats worldwide. Recommendations for testing, management and adoptions surrounding cats infected with these viruses has changed dramatically over the past decade. This presentation will give concrete recommendations for managing these diseases applicable to all sizes of organizations based on the latest research and recommendations available, combine with down-to-earth knowledge of the challenges cats with these viruses face.

Easy Enrichment for Every Budget

Amber Pazdzioch, Animal Advancement Manager, The Anti-Cruelty Society

Easy Enrichment for Every Budget will help give shelter staff and volunteers ideas of enrichment activities that can be done at every shelter, no matter the budget constraints. The presentation will include hands-on animal enrichment activities like playgroup, shelter dog and shelter cat class, and neighborhood walks for dogs. Also included will be a variety of handmade enrichment items that staff and volunteers can make for the animals, for little to no cost.

TUESDAY'S OPERATIONS SESSIONS CONTINUED

Setting Cat Adopters Up for Success

Pamela Hill, Cat Behavior Consultant, That Cat Girl, LLC

When it comes to relinquishment, you've heard it all-cats that hide, scratch, bite, fight, destroy, or opt out of using the litterbox. But is it really the cat...or might it be the owners? In this session, we will explore what cat owners do when integrating a cat into their home versus what cats need to thrive over a lifetime. We will talk about how unintentionally inadequate environments can result in unwanted behaviors, while lack of knowledge leads to misunderstandings about those behaviors and puts cats at risk of losing their home. Most importantly, you will gain a solid understanding of the most essential things cat adopters need to know about cat ownership and how you can help prepare and support them as they venture into a lifetime of comfort and companionship with their cat.

TUESDAY'S FIELD SERVICES SESSIONS

Horse Basics for Animal Welfare

Dr. Susan Albright, Veterinarian, Chenoa Veterinary Clinic

Have you ever been sent to investigate a complaint about a horse without knowing the first thing about equines? As resources for animal welfare and control dwindle, ACOs are now expected to conduct cruelty or neglect investigations about hooved animals in addition to their work with dogs and cats. This workshop will provide the basics in horse anatomy, care, and husbandry so that you can evaluate the environment, assess the physical condition, and issue recommendations for owners of horses who need better care.

Pet Retention and Rehoming Assistance

Amy-Jo Sites, Director, City of Fort Wayne Animal Care & Control

Creating an owner-surrender managed intake process in a municipal shelter can be challenging. Most of the time, animals are surrendered as an impulsive decision. We will share how we identified resources within our community to help keep pets in their homes without adding staff. Helping to empower people to rehome their own pets is another tool used before turning immediately to the shelter to relinquish their animal(s). What if there is no other option or it's an emergency? One of the responsibilities of an open access shelter is to still take in unwanted pets. Working with the individual to determine what the main issue is could ultimately lead to deterring an unnecessary relinquishment.

Are We There Yet? An Overdue Conversation about Community and Culture Competency

Kevin Hearst, Adjunct Professor/ Instructor, Law Enforcement Training Institute

This session brings resourceful ideas to help you create a supportive community that stands by you and your agency. Be the change you wish to see by implementing techniques that enhance Officer and community safety, and reduce conflict, complaints, and callbacks. As we strive to expand our sensitivity to cultural differences and diversity, this workshop will help you increase your knowledge and understanding of those cultures and assist you in managing conflict in your daily work.

Forensic Necropsy

Dr. Miranda Vieson, Clinical Assistant Professor in Anatomic Pathology, University of Illinois Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory

This presentation serves to introduce forensic necropsy in veterinary medicine. The intent is to provide some exposure and general concepts about what happens when an animal is submitted for forensic necropsy. I will provide some updates to how forensic cases are handled at UIUC VDL, briefly review some tips on submission, and present some cases to illustrate some of the major topics in veterinary forensics that I have seen since starting at University of Illinois in 2016.

COVID SAFETY PLAN

* Updated 5/26/21

The 2021 Prairie States Animal Welfare Conference will be slightly different than years past. To abide by current COVID-19 guidelines we will be implementing new procedures.

Illinois has entered a bridge phase of reopening and therefore we have been able to modify some of our plans.

Face coverings are still required while inside the hotel and conference center. Currently, this is a Hilton policy. If they change their policy, we will update our plan.

The workshop breakout rooms will now be set with tables that are rounds of ten. These tables will be spaced 6 feet apart, but individuals at the tables may or may not be socially distanced. Each breakout room will have six rounds of 10 giving us a maximum capacity of 60 people per breakout room. Currently, each track has approximately half that number of registered attendees. This means there should be plenty of space for everyone to have some elbow room. Should Illinois become fully open on June 11, as they are expecting to, then we will be able to go back to our usual classroom style seating in the breakout rooms.

You will not be required to sit in the same seat or track for the entire day. However, we will be keeping the current staggered schedule to aid with lines for meals and breaks. So, if you are wanting to attend sessions across multiple tracks, you will need to pay special attention to the start and end times of sessions. Please be respectful and do not enter a workshop after it has already begun.

We are happy to share that we can go back to our old model of having our sponsor tables and meals in one main ballroom. We will not be eating in the breakout rooms as previously planned. This means we will be able to hold our Keynote, General Session and Special Session all in this main ballroom. We will update this plan and make modifications to provide the best possible, yet safe in-person conference as things change in IL.
